Chairman's Report 2021

2021 was a challenging year for MCT as the pandemic dominated. The year began with the hopes of the vaccine rollout yet still ended with an Omicron surge. As religious groups our fellowship, communion, finances and outreach were all diminished. Who knew how much we would miss such simple things as after service coffee and being able to sing? In 2020 there seemed to be some excitement about lockdowns but this evaporated in 2021. While lives were saved the cost began to become clearer: increased loneliness, drinking, and gambling. Missed treatments, exams and holidays. And great frustration at plans being continually blown of course. For the country that hoped to take back control we now seemed completely out of control.

On the plus side MCT members made magnificent efforts to keep the faith show rolling. In Lent we organised a course looking at Faith in the Arts, which was attended by more than 100 people. Love Marlborough Kids Meals continued to deliver hot, nutritious food to the town's most needy families. The ministers became zoom Jedi and much worship occurred online. We learnt to stream and now breezily talk of mixed media worship. Who would have imagined all this in 2019? All the little gatherings online of 10 or 20 people did much to keep us going through dark times.

According to Christianity Today 38% of ministers considered quitting in 2021. The pressures have been intense. How can groups be led when some think Covid is a cold, yet others have run for the hills? Very little appreciation has gone to ministers as key workers - yet they visited people on covid wards and took funerals all through the pandemic. While technology is a great blessing it has been exhausting to use and so little feedback comes through the computer. Congregations have been cranky because they have been locked up again, but ministers are often the punchbag for their frustration. The fraternal has been a great source of support for ministers but they do need our love, prayers and support. Be a blessing to your minister!

One person who sadly left us in 2021 was Laura Willis. She served as the Administrator of the Marlborough Anglican Team for 14 years. Her role was very much behind the scenes but only in leaving did we all find out how much she did for churches across the town. We pray for a blessed retirement for her and Paul.

As we look to 2022 may God give us the end of the pandemic. The Bishop of London has said she feels after the pandemic ends it will take the churches two years to recover. May God keep us safe and help us through this process. And may somehow much good fruit be borne from a difficult time.

Mustard Seed 2021

As for us all, 2021 started in lockdown and we were able to open around Easter. In order to be sustainable staff wise, we chose to open Monday – Friday 10-3pm (we did open for 6 Saturdays before Christmas). An added challenge was that our coffeeshop manager was off for 6 months having medical treatment: staff and volunteers have been great at helping wherever possible. We have always been encouraged by the appreciation we get from so many of our customers; clearly Mustard Seed is a place where people find rest, restoration and refuge.

We have hosted two zoom author events which were appreciated; the Mustard Seed book group has reconvened and met several times – the earlier time of 4-5pm has suited most. We ran a bookstall for Pewsey Deanery who had an evening launching **Reflections for Daily Prayer** as Colin Heber-Percy is a contributor. We provided Bibles to 6 local primary schools and continue to supply our local churches.

Mustard Seed is seen as a Christian presence in the Town where particularly the lonely, those at one of the vulnerable stages in life, find something of the presence of God. That is our purpose and we appreciate the help we are given in practical ways and by prayer.

We were particularly grateful to Bill Colson for organising a funding event in Hilliers Yard just before Christmas.

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Marlborough Food Bank Distribution Point 2021

We have continued this year with a delivery service only as restrictions due to Covid have meant that this was the safest and most efficient way of helping our clients. Assessing the need for more Food boxes, advice and referral on to other Agencies are often done on the doorstep or maybe discussed by phone. Citizens Advice are particularly helpful although, due to high demand, can at times be frustratingly difficult to access.

Referrals continue to come mainly through the Devizes Foodbank but others have come directly from Care co-ordinators attached to surgeries and some via Kids Meals.

Numbers fluctuated over the summer months but as in previous years the demand has increased in the Autumn with the period around Christmas being particularly busy with 9 referrals a week. There is no doubt that the loss of the extra £20 a week to those on Universal Credit that had been given during the height of the Covid epidemic has been sorely missed. Low income, loss of jobs and debt are the main reason for referral.

We have been well supported by volunteers who help with collecting boxes from the Foodstore in Devizes and delivering of Food boxes locally and to villages as far afield as Shalbourne, Baydon and Alton Barnes.

Christchurch continue to be very helpful for their church to be used for storage of boxes.

This time last year I had hoped that by the Autumn we would have returned to a more personalised service by having a collection point at Christchurch on a Friday morning. It is however inadvisable while the Omicron variant is so easily transmissible but other factors too such as the cost of fuel and public transport from the villages needs to be considered.

Love Marlborough Kids Meals 2021

Throughout the lockdowns and afterwards in 2020-21, we delivered around 60 hot family meals each week to families and children who were struggling.

We still continue to feed around 12 families each week. We now provide a roast dinner on Fridays and also send eggs, bread and a bag of store cupboard ingredients and recipe suggestion for another meal during the week. We tell new families that we will provided this for 3 months.

The Rotary Club kindly donated funds for us to provide each family with a slow cooker and a budget-friendly recipe book at Christmas. We will now provide something similar to new families if needed, as this is a fuel-friendly approach to preparing meals.

We had a store cupboard collection at Tesco at Christmas, which was very helpful. The Waitrose hampers were also gratefully received. Both stores have been generous and supportive over the last year in various ways.

A small number of our families have experienced positive changes to their circumstances and have no longer needed our support. Other families have experienced additional crises and have re-joined our list. Examples include parental health difficulties and strain on a family budget when using petrol to visit a terminally ill relative.

We have provided longer term support for a small number of families who are marginalised for various reasons, for example: living off-grid where facilities and funds are very limited for the children; being cultural "outliers" where a single parent is re-training for her job, which demands time and organisational resources.

We anticipate that the change to universal credit and fuel prices will inevitably have an impact on those who already have challenges to their budget, or who unexpectedly experience health challenges. Referrals come from the Children's Centre and local Social Support Services and individuals through Facebook.

We continue to use Sue Brady Catering to cook our meals. We have one regular cook, Lynne Coplestone, and a team of helpers. We have a team of 9 delivery volunteers on a rota, with 3 delivery routes each week. In addition, there are 3 coordinators (Sian Ineson, Caroline Philps and myself) for liaising with families, volunteers and managing the project. We are provided with Treasurer support from Debbie Ryman through Love Marlborough and have IT support from Olwynne Goodrich at Easy Peasy Digital.

2022 Plans and needs:

We need another cook to help cover for holiday/illness/regular breaks.

We will need a top-up of our store cupboard soon and another collection morning at Tesco will be requested. We are to sign up for Fair Share with Tesco to add to our weekly food bags.

We would be supportive of a local voluntary service that provides a check-in for families relating to their benefits, fuel support and other social resources.

We are in a financial position to continue for 2022 with our regular and occasional donors, but will need to fundraise again in around 6 months' time, or sooner if numbers increase significantly.

Devotion 2021
